

# Beeston u3a Committee elected in May 2023 at the AGM

Committee members are elected each year. In addition, members may be co-opted to the committee with a view to taking on a bigger role when a committee member steps down.

#### **Review of the speakers at our Open Meetings**

#### April—Paul Cullen—Nottinghamshire Place Names

There was a high degree of interest in this topic, and Paul's presentation didn't disappoint. He started off by singing a little ditty which went through all the street names of Nottingham which referred to occupations and how they have been adapted and changed over the years: Wheelwright Lane, Cow Lane Bar, Sadler Gate, Pilcher Gate, Weekday Cross, Fletcher Gate and Hounds Gate. One can imagine the use that was put to the lanes and gates that led into the Market. The rich history of our area means that several different languages have existed over the centuries and Paul gave us a run through of what the different languages and dialects produced in terms of village and town names, often named after the land owner or the first person to set up a home in an area. Often during Anglo Saxon times, the names applied to



the topography of the land such as hill or marsh. He gave many examples of place names both in Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire, all of which are very well known to us all, and we can only imagine what the village or hamlet would have looked like at the time it was named. The names have certainly changed and been added to over the centuries as different people added their own bits, so that Breedon on the Hill contains the Celtic word "bre" for hill, the Old English word "dun" for hill, followed by the more modern "on the hill": talk about making sure everyone knows the village is on top of a hill!

#### June—Citizens Advice Broxtowe – Chris Pass and Liz Wilding

Chris and Liz stepped in at the last minute when the speaker was unable to attend, and they did a fine job in explaining what Citizens Advice is all about. Broxtowe employs 21 staff and there are 50 volunteers who work there on a part time basis, in the different branches around the Borough. Often people seek help from the Bureau about multiple issues, as, not surprisingly, those who are not claiming the correct benefits will also be falling into debt and may also be suffering from housing issues. The advisors will often seek further information, and challenge government or local government about policy which is letting some people down. During the



last few years, the demand for help has increased, putting pressure on the existing level of service, and they are therefore trying to increase volunteer numbers. A period of training is undergone, and there is lots of support available, but there is no doubt that volunteers are carrying out a valuable service for those who may be less fortunate than ourselves.


Here we are complete with harnesses to ensure nobody gets to fall off.

#### **Cryptic Crosswords**

Beeston U3A now has 3 Cryptic Crossword groups; we've come a long way in a short time!


Shortly before lockdown a group of people got together because they wanted to learn how to do cryptic crosswords. They used a book put together by Henry Howarth, the national U3A guru of all things cryptic. However, things got tricky trying to work together on Zoom during the pandemic so the group took a break.

After lockdown, the group was sort of resurrected. Meetings were initially held on Zoom still, but the group was more a 'solving together' than 'learning together' gathering. It is now called the 'Experienced group' and is still going strong with meetings at the Star focussed on the Guardian Cryptic crossword for Mondays (they are supposed to be easier) and Fridays (we wanted more challenge!).

However, it was still felt that there was a need for a Beginners' group where absolute beginners could learn about the intricacies of 'double definitions', 'charades', 'inclusions', 'anagrams' etc. At the Fair in 2022 we recruited a group of people who were keen to learn. Over the year we worked through the Henry Howarth book, using it as a course. Gradually other activities were introduced including designing thematic clues themselves and having a go at 'real' crosswords such as the Times Quick Cryptic. This group have now 'graduated' (they even got certificates) and have formed the Intermediate Group. They still meet twice a month at the Star and work together on the Guardian Quiptic and the Times Quick Cryptic.

We wondered if anyone else would be interested in taking part in a new course so advertised in the rolling notices. The answer was a definite 'yes' and the new Beginners' Group began meeting in March, again at the Star. Despite some trepidation people seem to have really joined in enthusiastically with the sessions being led by members of the Experienced Group.

Having done Cryptic crosswords for most of my life, I've learnt so much from doing the course and also introducing it to others. I think that what comes over most strongly is how much more fun it is to work on something like this with others, and it's always so satisfying to hear the sounds of satisfaction (or the groans!) when someone 'gets' the answer but also the reasoning behind it. Besides which, we all know the importance of keeping our brains active and learning new things

#### **Family History**

We were pleased to welcome a guest speaker in April: John from Long Eaton. He spoke about the Bestwick family, traced back to a John Bestwick who married Catherine in Staffordshire in 1598. John has around 800 people in his family tree, and he's careful to check the accuracy of data: for example, obtaining birth certificates disproved family stories about where certain people in the family were born.

In the past, Long Eaton was the centre of the lace industry in Britain, and many of his family worked in that connection, including as lace designers.

In May and June group members shared their knowledge of what their parents (or other relatives) experienced in World War II. Some remained in England, some taking in evacuees, others went overseas with the services, with some near-misses, while some members were able to show medals obtained and original war service records. The meetings provided an opportunity for a wide range of members to contribute.

#### International Folk Dancing—SALI Dancers

#### Landscape and Environment



In June, members of the Landscape Group held an outdoor meeting in Wollaton Park to walk, look, listen and try to understand the evolution of the landscape.

We heard how in 1580 Sir Francis Willoughby employed the architect, Robert Smythson, to build him a great house on top of a hill to project to one and all the wealth, power and influence of his

family. We learned the important role played by the underlying geology in shaping the landscape both physical and

economic. The strata found in the Castle Rock Sandstone of the Triassic Age proved resistant to erosion and now underlies the high ground on which Wollaton Hall stands, while the wealth required to build and maintain such a house and deer park came from the many coalmines of Carboniferous Age in Cossall, Trowell and Wollaton, owned by the Willoughby family.

We finished our walk with a visit to one of the finest trees in Nottingham, the "Big Oak" on Arbour Hill, followed by a coffee and chat in the courtyard café.

#### Local Heritage List

Are you concerned about the loss and potential loss of historic buildings, monuments and green spaces in the local area?

Beeston and District Civic Society is working with the Conservation Officer at Broxtowe Borough Council to identify

assets which we would like to preserve. Some Heritage buildings, monuments and green spaces are already protected by National Grade Listing, Heritage Environment Records and being in Conservation Areas. We are now looking for additional unprotected assets which can be considered for inclusion on a Local Heritage List and afforded some protection against demolition or inappropriate refurbishment. We need your help to identify suitable assets.

The Local Heritage List will cover all of Broxtowe, but Beeston Civic Society has specifically been tasked with engaging people and encouraging them to nominate suitable buildings and green spaces in Attenborough, Beeston, Bramcote, Chilwell and Toton for consideration of inclusion in the Local Heritage List. From experiences across the Country, community involvement in Local Heritage Listing projects has been crucial and resulted in an engaged community, proud of their heritage and willing to defend it from harm in the future.

Suggestions will be assessed against a strict set of criteria including Architectural/Artistic or landmark value, rarity, age, historic value, social and community interest and group value (i.e. being amongst or linked to other valued heritage places). Oban House is an example of a building that could be on the Local Heritage List, as is Fishpond Cottage opposite Bramcote Park and the NatWest Bank in Beeston centre but we feel sure local people will be aware of many more. Stories about why people value certain buildings will be the life blood of the project.

Against criteria set by the Borough Council the merits of each nomination will be considered, initially by the Civic Society but ultimately by local heritage experts. Owners of properties will be informed of the intention to add their asset onto the Local Heritage List.

The engagement phase will take place throughout spring and summer 2023.

So presently, our Civic Society is looking for nominations of suitable buildings and places as well as opportunities to engage with individuals and groups, in person and via social media. We'd like the views of yourself, your neighbours and your colleagues either through them emailing us (please include as many details about the nomination as possible) at LHL.<u>beestoncivicsociety@gmail.com</u> or at Local Heritage List – Beeston Civic Society.
